TOPIC for ACTION Butler - Cowley Nursing Partnership, Cowley Winfield Campus

REPORT:

Butler Community College's Nursing Program and Cowley County Community college will enter into an agreement for a shared commitment to increase Butler's nursing program by a total of 16 students. The partnership will begin by adding 8 students in fall 2023 with 8 additional students enrolled in fall 2024 at the Cowley Community College's Winfield campus. This addition of "open seats" for Butler's Nursing program has been approved by KSBN.

The ADN coursework will be delivered through a combination of distance learning and onsite instruction with support from the Butler site. Faculty will teach clinical and lab experiences with technical support at the Cowley site and most clinicals will be completed in Winfield and Arkansas City. William Newton Hospital in Winfield Kansas and South Central Kansas Medical Center in Arkansas City, Kansas are both small critical access hospitals that are experiencing a shortage of nurses. Cowley County and Sumner County Kansas are small rural Kansas communities without nursing programs to supply the demand for local health care within their geographic area. With the full support of both rural hospitals, the partnership between Butler Community College and Cowley College will provide potential nurses without the need to establish a new school of nursing at Cowley Community College. Student admissions will focus on Cowley and Sumner County residents. Cowley is prepared to provide prerequisite and potentially co-requisite courses that meet Butler's transfer course standards.

REPORT:

Butler Community College Nursing Program and Cowley County Community college will enter into an agreement for a shared commitment to increase the Butler nursing program by a total of 16 students. The partnership will begin by adding 8 students in fall 2023 with 8 additional students enrolled in fall 2024 at the Cowley Community College's Winfield campus.

Simulation and lab equipment is needed to provide expected learning experiences at the Winfield site that will meet Butler's required course and curriculum outcomes as well as meet accreditation standards. Simulation and lab equipment requested for purchase from Gaumard, Pocket Nurse, Armstrong, and Kendall are consistent with equipment in current Butler simulation labs allowing faculty and students at both sites similar teaching and learning experiences. The total purchase cost for this equipment is \$81,799.80 to be paid with Maintenance of Effort Funds.

TOPIC for ACTION Residence Halls Access Controls

REPORT:

Physical Security is a top priority for Butler Community College students, staff and faculty. Through the capital mill levy, the College was able to take the next steps in physical security by installing access controls on all exterior buildings and some interior doors which impacted the institution in multiple ways. It gave the college the ability to lock down the campus in case of an emergency. Access Controls automated the unlocking/locking of doors on campus, no longer needing someone to unlock all the doors each morning and secure them at night. Previously, when someone lost a key, the exterior doors had to be rekeyed and everyone who needed access to the doors had to be issued a new key. Access controls changed the way Butler stays secure and how operational resources are utilized.

Even though Butler has transitioned to access controls for exterior doors and some interior doors, there is a continued need in the Residence Halls for a more seamless process for assigning keys to 377 Residence Hall occupants. Currently students carry an access card for the exterior doors to the Residence Halls and a physical key for their room. If a student loses their physical key or key is stolen, the core must be rekeyed, and new keys must be issued to the students assigned to the room. With access controls, when an individual's card is lost or stolen, a visit to the Service Desk is all it takes to disable the old card and a have new card issued. In addition, if a student is asked to vacate the Residence Halls due to a policy violation, or leaves college for some reason, access to the residence halls and room can be easily revoked from the administration portal.

With the addition of access controls to the Residence Halls rooms, students can utilize the HID mobile app installed on their phones if they don't want an access control card. Students are less likely to lose their phone than their key. Students will not be able to swap keys with other students due to the security token (door access) being tied strictly to the phone. The overall access controls project for the Residence Halls would streamline operational processes and provide a better experience for students, Residence Hall Staff, and Campus Police.

In 2018 Butler partnered with American Digital Security (ADS) for Access Controls deployment and since then, has been a collaborative partner for all Access Controls. American Digital Security knows Butler's system, has access to the current systems and does not require additional Butler resources and time to complete this proposal. Bringing in a new partner would cost more due to the time needed to learn the current environment and required additional Butler resources for accessing our systems. The project cost through American Digital Security for access controls on 193 doors is a total cost \$231,153.11

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

The Board approve purchases of Access controls from American Digital Security for \$231,153.11.

TOPIC for ACTION Info~Tech – IS Strategic Master Plan and Consulting Services

REPORT:

In 2012 Butler Community College began a collaborative partnership with Info~Tech Research Group. Info~Tech produces highly relevant research to help institutions, CIOs, and IT departments make strategic, timely, and well-informed decisions. Info~Tech partners closely with IT teams to provide resources ranging from actionable tools to analyst guidance, ensuring they deliver measurable results for their organizations. In 2013 Butler engaged Info~Tech to facilitate an institutional IT strategic planning workshop. Some of the key takeaways from that workshop included the necessary infrastructure projects that were funded through the Capital Mill Levy. In 2020, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Butler Community College suspended the advisory service from Info~Tech.

As Butler approaches the 10-year mark of that strategic planning workshop and as required under criterion 5 of HLC accreditation, it is necessary for the Information Services Division to renew the collaborative relationship with Info~Tech. The I.S. Division will engage Info~Tech to facilitate the IT strategy workshop to aid in the updated HLC required Technology Master Plan with outcomes in part to also provide some of the necessary tools to the IS staff for continual improvements in service delivery and support in an evolving environment.

Narrative

As part of Butler's strategic goals and priorities, the college strives to attract and retain the best employees. Approximately 5 years ago, Butler completed a college-wide compensation student with Segal Waters to determine the college's competitive market position, compensation policies and practices that take into consideration the labor market, internal equity and the College's fiscal conditions.

Current Outcomes

In the 2021-2022 budget, a 5% salary increase was negotiated across the board for all classified employees. Also included was 0.5% of salary budget to address market and internal equity shortcomings. These funds were used to continue to bring employees to the bottom of the new pay range and to address internal equity within certain groups where recruitment and retention were factors.

Action items for future outcomes

The initial upcoming budget for FY23 includes a salary increase that is yet to be finalized through negotiations as well as a 0.5% of salary budget to continue to address market and internal equity shortcomings. Annually there needs to be continued support for the additional budget dollars to fully address inequities and ongoing market stability of the college's pay structures and incumbent salaries which currently is increasingly difficult with inflation and a highly competitive job market. The budget will be finalized in July/August.

Strategic Alignment

The members of the Board of Trustees at Butler Community College support a personnel policy, one which allows the college to recruit and retain highly qualified employees. The board subscribes to a philosophy of compensation that recognizes the value and contributions of each employee to the overall success and purpose of our college in meeting student and community need.

Butler's automated Performance Management system allows employees and supervisors to engage through conversations on goal setting, future goals, professional development plans and evaluation processes. The processes are designed to be ongoing conversations during the year beyond the annual and interim formal evaluations.

Current Outcomes

The integrated Performance Management format which has been in place for two years ties together job descriptions as well as evaluations but also allows notes and updates to be included throughout the year as employees meet with supervisors to discuss job progression and goal attainment. The ability to include this additional information creates an ongoing dialog as well as documentation of an employee's growth.

The purchase and implementation of Tovuti software will enhance these processes as well as it will further document formal professional development attainment through conference, webinars and coursework.

Action items for future outcomes

A goal in the upcoming summer months is the formation of a faculty team to review their evaluation instrument and processes for future integration into the same Performance Management system currently being used by all other classified employees.

Strategic Alignment

Enhancing Employee Success and Excellence is reflected in a continuing effort to develop each employee's professional skills, knowledge and abilities. During the performance management process, employees establish goals for professional development and identify their personal contribution to the strategic priorities of the college and performance standards for their respective roles.

Narrative

To drive institutional stability, growth, and innovation, it is critical that Butler create multi-year plans to address deferred maintenance needs, innovative opportunities and technology advances including increasing costs. Federal HEERF funds, rather an ending unencumbered cash at this point, have been set aside and have allowed the College to begin to plan to address these expectations in a number of areas.

Current Outcomes

Transfer from Indirect HEERF funds of \$3,412,469 for Simpson projects, \$862,986 to address the electrical infrastructure project, and \$1,898,587 from the 9100 Building sale are now in the deferred maintenance designated fund. The college currently has an list of critical deferred maintenance needs totally nearly \$6M in addition to the Simpson and electrical infrastructure projects. Additionally, \$500,000 in HEERF funds in additional to \$1M from unencumbered cash at the end of FY21 have been set aside in a self-insured designated fund allowing the college to begin the process of self-funded health insurance during the FY22 year. HEERF funds were used to set aside \$500,000 to address increased property insurance deductible costs. A strategic innovation designated fund has also been created with \$2M transferred from the operating fund in combination with \$100,000 from HEERF funds.

Action items for future outcomes

As discussion continues on the FY23 budget with final approval expected in July/August, fund plans will be finalized that include timelines, projects and use of the funds. It will also be determined if additional unencumbered cash should be set aside at the end of FY22 or if the opportunity afforded by the HEERF funds is enough for the next year to support deferred maintenance, innovation, and technology needs.

Strategic Alignment

This performance indicator is part of the colleges 2021-2023 Strategic Plan with the college's goal to "Drive Institutional Sustainability and Growth" under which Priority 3 calls for the institution to increase fund reserves to support future financing of strategic priorities and innovations.

Current Outcomes

Training materials were developed over the past number of months, and during April Institutional Development Days, Shelley Stultz and Tiffany Rhodes hosted 2 sessions to train Search Committee Chairs. There were more than 50 participants in the training.

Action items for future outcomes

Additional training opportunities are being planned for June and July for those who couldn't attend during IDD. The training materials will continue to be updated and will be added to the mandatory training modules required to be completed by employees on an annual basis.

Strategic Alignment

This project advances the college's strategic goal to Inspire Values of Equity and Access by better preparing not only Search Committee Chairs but also committee members and all Butler employees in preparation of their role in hiring future Butler employees. It addresses the priority to "Enhance recruiting and hiring practices to support a diverse workforce."
