EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Fine Arts and Communication Division is comprised of the following academic departments: Art, Dance, Mass Communication, Music (Vocal and Instrumental), Speech, and Theatre.
- The division is responsible for several public relations-oriented student activities including *The Lantern* newspaper, *The Grizzly* magazine, KBTL campus radio station, and Butler TV.
- The division also manages the Erman B. White Art Gallery.
- The division includes thirteen full-time faculty members, three temporary full-time faculty, approximately 53 adjunct faculty members, one full-time administrator, one full-time administrative assistant, and two part-time student workers.
- Over 300 sections of courses are offered throughout the academic year.

Division Dean (Interim): Valerie Haring

- Valerie Haring earned her AA degree from Butler CC after graduating from Circle High School. Additionally, she earned her BSE from Emporia State University, and her MA in Art Education from Wichita State University.
- She taught in an adjunct capacity in the Butler CC art department for nine years prior to becoming the Chair, a position she held for 21 years, prior to serving as Interim Dean of the FAC.
- She served as Co-Director of the E. B. White Gallery, member of the PROVIDE committee, Academic Retention Team, Textbook Affordability Team, CARE Team, Inclusion Council, Faculty Book Club, Summer Jam, Coutts Museum Board,
 - El Dorado Artscape, Valley Center Consortium, and many more throughout her career.
- She and her husband, John Oehm (former BCC art faculty), had a two-person art exhibit at RSG (Reuben Saunders Gallery), Wichita KS.
- She is currently taking Acting 1 and Tap Dance 1 at Butler CC, courtesy of the generosity of the Butler BOT Discounted Tuition initiative for full-time employees of the college.

Administrative Assistant: Natasha Gravatt

- Natasha earned her AA degree from Coffeyville Community College after graduating from Fredonia High School. Additionally, she earned her BFA from Emporia with an emphasis in glass and a minor in art history. She then earned an AAS from Flint Hills Technical College with an emphasis in graphic arts technology.

Activity Scholarship Students

The Fine Arts and Communication Division is responsible for administering nearly 300 activity scholarships which are awarded to full-time students in Art, *The Grizzly*, *The Lantern*, Radio/TV, Sports Media, Instrumental Music, Vocal Music, Theatre (performance and technical), and Box Office Management. **Recruiting** these talented students and providing the support they need once they are here requiring a great deal of time and effort from the division's administration, faculty, and staff. The goal is to keep each student on track to graduate in two years while also fulfilling the demanding requirements of the activity scholarship. Each activity student spends 10-30 hours per week meeting the obligations of their scholarship.

Student Degree Comparison – Completion and Declared Majors

While the degree completion numbers in the FAC Division are slightly down since 2018, the number of declared majors continues to rise. (See Table 1).

*Degree Completion – the FAC had embarked on an initiative to increase degree completion. Many students are simply unaware of the benefits of degree completion. The FAC Dean will be holding "degree completion awareness" workshops beginning in spring 2023.

Enrollment Comparison – Credit Hours Taught

While the number of declared majors and degree completions has increased as noted above, overall division enrollment has declined slightly over the past few years (see Table 2).

- COVID restrictions had a profound effect on face-to-face performance and studio classes.
- The FAC Division continues student recruitment efforts in art, mass communication, music (instrumental and vocal), and theatre focused primarily on Kansas high school students.
- The majority of the credit hours produced in the FAC Division result from courses which fulfill general education requirements (e.g., Art Appreciation, Music Appreciation, Public Speaking, etc.) for students throughout Butler.

Art Department Mission Statement

The Art Department will facilitate learning within programs and services that address the needs of student and stakeholders in the region including:

- Preparing students for **transfer** to colleges and universities
- Preparing students for **careers** as artists and art educators
- Providing **visual/cultural enrichment** to students and stakeholders through art exhibits in the E. B. White Gallery
- Developing Learning PACT skills

- Providing access to student learning through multiple locations and delivery systems
- Providing instructional leadership for the college

The Art Department is a performance-based system that evaluates programs and services by documenting and evaluating student skills and knowledge and stakeholder satisfaction.

Department Overview

The Butler Art Department is one of the **top-tier, two-year art programs** in the region. Students who go through our art program earn sizeable transfer scholarships, win prestigious awards and honors, and complete seamless transfer to four-year institutions and the regional workforce. Alumni include artists working on the east and west coasts, throughout the mid-west, and on the international stage. We have produced accomplished photographers and filmmakers, graphic designers, museum and gallery specialists, studio artists, educators at every level of education, Spring 2022

- The art department saw a full renovation of the HVAC system in the 300 building. The art studios and classrooms now have consistent temperatures, appropriate humidity, and the walls received a fresh coat of paint.
- Art student Jimena Trujillo-Hanqui was awarded a prestigious \$10,000 per year
 transfer scholarship to continue her arts education at Wichita State University.
 This scholarship was awarded on the strength of her portfolio, created as an art
 student at Butler. She was also a 2022 finalist for the Hubbard Award of
 Excellence.
- Rachel Foster took groups of art students to meet faculty and visit the facilities of potential transfer schools. They visited both the University of Nebraska Lincoln and Fort Hays State University.

Summer 2022

 Three art students, Kierstin Barton, Savanna Nichols, and Brock Jurging, were commissioned to paint murals in three different 200 building classrooms.
 Working with instructors in that building, these students proposed and painted lively murals that add excitement and energy to the classrooms.

August 2022

• The Butler art scholarship students walked in the **City of Gold Parade**, representing the Butler Art Department.

September 2022

 The Butler ceramics department hosted a Bowl-a-Thon event where students and community members could spend the evening making a bowl to donate to the Empty Bowls Wichita event, an **annual fundraiser** for the Wichita Food Bank. Over 30 attended, and more than 50 bowls were donated to the event.

October 2022

- Books and Tuition scholarship student Eli Uffman **volunteered** at Walter's Pumpkin Patch demonstrating various pumpkin carving techniques.
- Art students Onnika Vanover and Trinity McKinnon and instructors Trisha Coates and Tyler Stonestreet represented Butler Ceramics while **volunteering** at the annual Empty Bowls Wichita Event, which raised more than \$40,000 for the Wichita Food Bank.

November 2022

• The Butler Art Department hosted an **open house recruiting event** with participation from 30 high school seniors from surrounding high schools. Our

- scholarship students filled the morning with art-making activities and campus tours, while faculty led portfolio reviews and discussed scholarship opportunities.
- Art faculty Trisha Coates and Rachel Foster attended the Topeka Public Schools
 Fine Arts Fair to recruit for the Butler art department. They visited with several
 hundred high school students interested in pursuing art at the college level.

December 2022

Four art students, Kierstin Barton, Savanna Nichols, Basil Winzer, and Claire
Davidson had artwork accepted into the Sunflower Biennial, hosted by the
Salina Art Center. The Sunflower Biennial is a juried exhibition of visual art to
recognize artists in Kansas, age 15-24, for dedication, achievement, and
contribution to exchanges that reveal life. Over 300 works were submitted to this
exhibition, making our students' acceptance a prestigious recognition.

Art Department Initiatives

- Faculty continue to pursue professional exhibition opportunities for themselves and their students
- 2+2 agreements are being pursued with Wichita State University and McPherson College to ensure seamless transfer for art students graduating from Butler CC
- Broadening partnerships with Butler's own digital design programs and initiatives;
 enhancing studio art classes with digital design technology

Gallery

The Erman B White Gallery is located in the 700 building on the El Dorado campus. The gallery is **open to the public** M-F, 10 am – 4 pm. The Gallery is staffed by art scholarship students. There is typically an **artist reception/gallery talk** on the third Thursday of each month, 6-8 pm. Light refreshments are served. The gallery hosts three exhibitions each semester. In Fall 2022 the exhibitions included work by:

- Georgia artists Stephen Harmon and Amy Nelson
- Kansas artists Barbara Waterman-Peters and Larry Peters
- Wichita artist and Butler alum Lori Santos, and Peruvian artist Vladimir Ramos.
 As part of the programming for the Santos and Ramos exhibition, the art department hosted both artists for a morning of demonstrations and talks, giving our students a chance to work alongside prominent international artists.
- The 2023 season is underway with the following exhibits:
 Butler Faculty Biennial, highlighting work from the **Butler art faculty** including Valerie Haring, Trisha Coates, Rachel Foster, James Gross, Wilfried Fathi, Roberta Sheahan, Adelia Wise, Phillip Robl, David and Susan Harmon. January 23 March 4, Reception: Thursday, February 16th from 6-8 pm
- The three-dimensional design students will have an opportunity to take over the gallery in the month of March to explore creating large-scale installations.
 March 20 - April 5
- The semester will end with the **annual Student Juried Exhibition** and reception. April 13 May 5, Reception: Thursday, April 13th from 6-8.
- Student Art Sale Tuesday May 9th from 10-4

Twenty art students exhibited at the **Coutts Museum** of art for their spring showcase in April 2022. We continue to have a strong relationship with this organization, and hope to continue to strengthen ties between the Coutts Museum and the Butler art department.

Faculty

Trisha Coates worked alongside First United Methodist church in downtown Wichita during the Lenten season of 2022 to create a community driven, **collaborative artwork** that was installed in the entryway of the church. In the fall of 2022 her proposal was accepted to complete a large-scale sculpture for the April Sampson Cancer Center in Lincoln. NE. The center will open in the fall of 2023, and she will spend Summer 2023 constructing the artwork, which will hang in a prominent location in the research wing. **Rachel Foster** gave a presentation on her work at the 43rd annual Southwest Popular/American Culture Association Conference in Albuquerque, New Mexico. She also exhibited in numerous shows, including "The December Show" at the Jones Gallery in Kansas City, "Potluck: It's All About Food" at the Reuben Saunders Gallery in Wichita and "Dangerous Lullabies VIII" at The Dole in Crystal Lake, Illinois.

The art department hired **Tyler Stonestreet** as the Temporary Full-Time instructor for the Spring 2023 semester. Tyler started his higher education at Garden City Community college and went on to graduate with a BA in Studio Art from Wichita State University and an MFA in ceramics from West Virginia University. He has traveled and lived throughout the country and world, including South America, China, and the Philippines and brings a diverse perspective to the classroom. The art department is excited to have him onboard.

Adjunct Faculty teaching in the Butler CC art department continue to make and exhibit their artworks. Every adjunct has a Master's degree and at least 18 credit hours within their discipline.

- Providing instruction in personal interest areas
- Developing Learning PACT skills
- Providing instructional leadership for the college

The Dance Program is a performance-based system that evaluates programs and services by documenting and evaluating student skills and knowledge and stakeholder satisfaction.

Dance Department Overview

Faculty Professional Accomplishments

- Valerie Mack provides leadership for the Dance Department and teaches all tap and Choreography classes.
- The Department currently has two adjunct faculty members, Jaden Kindle and Taylor Staley. They teach at two private area dance studios, assist at WSU, Newton dance studios, Music Theatre of Wichita (MTW), MTYP, Jester coordination, and choreograph and adjudicate for high school musicals and dance teams around the state.
- As part of the wealth of knowledge and diversity they bring to the department, Jaden performs at the Crown, the Roxy, the Melodramas and MTWichita.

The Butler Dance Department serves approximately 120 Butler students. The majority of our dancers come from area high schools but we have attracted students from other states and overseas. Several of our current students have received **dance scholarships** with four-year schools and **dance job opportunities**.

This spring, 2023, the Butler Choreography classes will be returning to Andover Central High School to create original choreography for the 105-singer/dancer Andover Central Vocal Music Department. The Butler students will receive **real world (and paid) job experience** as well as provide PR and a great **community service** for a Butler county high school.

Former Butler Dance Department students are working with **professional dance companies**, Disney, Universal, Lego Land, 6 Flags, Worlds of Fun; theme parks, at off-Broadway shows, and at Carnegie Hall. They are also private dance studio owners, show choir directors, high school teachers, choreographers, news reporters, radio personalities, and educators. Butler dancers have been (or are currently) employed at

Disney as Prince Charming, Cinderella, Mickey Mouse, Minnie Mouse, Tinkerbell, and Chip and Dale.

Local university dance instructors, private studio owners, and individuals at Music Theatre of Wichita have commented on the **impressive talents** coming from the Butler Dance Department. Our dance faculty will again be adjudicating and choreographing all year long.

Our December 2022 **dance showcase** was well attended. Students also presented their own choreography for performances during the last week of class. In May 2023, the **dance and art and theatre departments** will come together for the dance showcase and present wearable art and the theatre make-up class will be providing makeup and hairstyles for the art models.

The spring, 2023 dance showcase will be a **collaboration** between the Dance, Vocal Music, Theatre, and Visual Art departments. Runway models will be costumed with wearable art and makeup and hair will be provided by students from the visual arts and theatre departments.

The dancers will be **helping area schools**, **YMCA**'s, **local dance studios** and the CYT program using their choreography and teaching skills.

Music Theatre of Wichita invited students to audition for their summer program as the director was so impressed with the skill levels from the Butler Vocal and Dance Departments.

Mass Communication Department Mission Statement

Butler's Fine Arts and Communication Division will facilitate learning within the Mass Communication Department. The department will also facilitate learning within the following services and activities: *The Lantern* newspaper, *The Grizzly* magazine, KBTL Radio, Sports Media, and Butler TV. The Mass Communication Department services and activities will address the needs of students and stakeholders in the region including:

- Preparing students to **transfer** to colleges and universities
- Preparing students for **careers** related to mass communications
- Providing communication and technical skills related to mass communications
- Providing instruction in personal interest areas
- Developing Learning PACT skills
- Providing instructional leadership for the college
- Providing news information to the college and community
- Preparing students to be critical consumers of mass media
- The Lantern and Grizzly Magazine are using InDesign publishing software.
 Many professional publications use this. Reporting 1 students try to publish their stories, and have accomplished this with some work in The Lantern and The Butler County Times-Gazette.

The Mass Communication Department is a performance-based system that evaluates its programs and services by documenting and evaluating student skills and knowledge and stakeholders' satisfaction. We continue to build on the success of the program over the decades. Students are often involved in Mass Communication activities seven days a week.

<u>Faculty & Loads</u>: Mike Swan (Full time professor, retired at end of Spring 2022 semester), Dr. Keith West (Full time professor, **KBTL and BCTV** student production advisor, department chair, 5 hour load Summer 2022, 27 hour load Fall 2022, 27 hour load Spring 2023), Amy Chastain (Full time English professor, **Lantern** newspaper advisor, 1 hour load for Mass Communication Fall 2022 and Spring 2023), Matt Jacobs (Full Time **BCTV** Executive Producer, **Grizzly magazine and Sports Media** advisor, 10 hour load for Mass Communication Fall 2022 and Spring 2023), Jeffrey Welch (High School teacher Wichita South, 6 hour load for Mass Communication Fall 2022 and Spring 2023), Ian Bailey (Full Time video professional, team teaching 3 hour load in Mass Communication with Dr. West Spring 2023).

With the retirement of Mike Swan, Mass Communication has had to co-op Matt Jacobs to teach 10 credit-hour load each semester, including advising Grizzly Magazine and Sports Media. Despite this and training Ian Bailey as future adjunct, Dr. West has had to assume 27 credit hour loads each semester. This includes department chair, Curriculum committee, General Manager of KBTL radio and advising radio-television students.

Publication/Distribution:

The Lantern newspaper publishes a print edition each semester, in addition to ongoing digital content available on the Web and social media channels.

The Grizzly magazine produced one edition in Fall 2022 and plans to publish two print editions in the Spring 2023. This is in addition to digital content, social media and a planned audio podcast featuring original content and print edition stories.

KBTL radio broadcasts 24/7 music and information content year-round with a mix of classic rock/jazz, student music features, talk shows, syndicated shows, sports and podcasts. Programming is also streamed via Web and podcast subscriptions.

BCTV distributes student-produced content via Cox Cable 20 to the surrounding communities and via our YouTube channel (Butler Student Media). Primary student-produced programs include a bi-weekly magazine show Campus Edge and a skit comedy show McGrizzles! each semester. Students also produce short films, educational and promotional videos, and sports.

The **Sports Media** students produce play-by-play and color for radio for all football, women's basketball and men's basketball games, including Region 6 tournaments and national bowl/finals games. Spring 2023 will bring baseball and softball to KBTL radio. Students supply news and feature articles, along with photographs and video, to both the Lantern newspaper (print and online) and the Grizzly magazine (print and online). All student media is supported by fees and provided free to the general public.

Special Events and Activities/Institutional Service: Amy Chastain recently took a number of students to Osage County, Oklahoma, to pursue the 1920's Osage murder

case featured at Butler by the author. She has accompanied students to the Kansas Collegiate Media workshops, as well as officer retreats.

Matt Jacobs continues to involve Butler students in BCTV professional productions, as well as stadium coverage of **Wichita Windsurge** baseball games.

Dr. Keith West has coordinated radio remotes and special broadcasts throughout the year. KBTL was the first college radio station in Kansas to participate in World College Radio Day, sponsored by the College Radio Foundation. Over 600 stations across the world broadcast for 24 hours, sharing programming and personnel 2022 marked the 11consecutive year. KBTL also participated in 2022 Vinylthon, where only records are broadcast. Approximately 250 stations in the country are involved, also sponsored by the College Radio Foundation. Over 150 hot dogs and station-branded swag were distributed on the El Dorado campus last October during Halloweenie Roast, and the station provided music and impromptu karaoke at the Final Late-Night Breakfast in December. Under the supervision of Dr. West, broadcast news students will be producing interviews with local personalities for the Theatre Program's production of Working. Emporia State University initiated a 2+2 agreement with Butler, accepting the AAS Radio-Television degree completely within their strategic communication major. Due to modifications in the ESU academic program, this agreement is still in process. To support the "Year of Podcasts" at Butler, Dr. West delivered a series of training workshops on podcasting creation and performance for In-Service, IDD, and 2nd Saturday faculty training.

All faculty are involved in **recruiting** efforts, including Grizzly Senior Days at El Dorado and Andover, Fine Arts Day at El Dorado, **individual tours and interviews** at the El Dorado campus, emails, mailings, posters and travel to various schools and state conferences. The faculty work closely with Advising and Marketing, responding to student requests. In Fall, Dr. West met with a representative of the KU School of Journalism and Mass Communication to discuss **transfer issues and new degrees** at KU for Butler graduates.

<u>Contests: 2022 Kansas Collegiate Media (KCM)</u> – Lantern newspaper and Grizzly magazine complete with all public 2-year programs in Kansas. Overall, 45 individual and overall **publication awards** were received by 15 students representing the Journalism and Sports Media pathways in Mass Communication. This included a Silver award for Overall 2-year Newspapers and Silver Award for Overall 2-year Publication for the magazine. Awards were presented at the KCM conference, attended by Butler Students.

2022 Kansas Association of Broadcasters (KAB) – KBTL radio and BCTV television compete with all 2-year and 4-year public and private institutions in Kansas. Overall, 15 **individual and group awards** were received by 10 students representing the Radio-Television pathway in Mass Communications. This was seven times more awards than all of the other Kansas 2-year colleges combined, and the 2nd most awards received compared to 4-year institutions (KSU received more). Awards were presented at the KAB Student Workshop, attended by Butler students.

Butler students also entered print, broadcast, sports and digital media projects in the **College Media Association Pinnacle Awards**, an international competition. Broadcast, sports and digital media projects were also entered in the **College Broadcasting Inc** student competition, also an international contest. While none of the Butler student entries received awards, we have in the past and plan to continue submitting entries in the future.

<u>Faculty Organization Participation</u>: Amy Chastain, Lantern newspaper advisor, is very active in the state through Kansas Collegiate Media, assisting with their Spring contests as booth coordinator and judge. She has served as judge for two rounds of high school print contests sponsored by Wichita Area Journalism Educators.

Matt Jacobs, Grizzly magazine and Sports Media advisor, has been instrumental in Wichita Windsurge game coverage, as well as working with various national television networks in sports media. He attended the 2022 National Association of Broadcasters conference, obtaining technical information and forming professional contacts. He also has served as a judge for student productions sponsored by Wichita Area Journalism Educators.

Jeffrey Welch is very active in high school journalism and digital media. He is one of the founders of the **Wichita Area Journalism Educators** for middle school and high school teachers, as well as the state high school journalism organization. He is an honored educator, and has been a Butler adjunct instructor for over 15 years.

Dr. Keith West, radio-television advisor, is guite active with the Kansas Association of Broadcasters. He recently, along with the radio advisor from KSU, redesigned the KAB's student production competition for 2023. In 2022, he served as a judge for KAB high school entries, and a judge of professional entries through the Wisconsin Association of Broadcasters. As Butler doesn't have a broadcast engineer, he serves in this role and attended a 4-state Broadcast Engineering workshop sponsored by KAB and the Alabama Society of Engineers. He is a long-time judge of photography and speaking/performance events for **Kansas 4-H**, including three county fairs (4H and open class photography), the Kansas Wheat Expo's photography competition, and speaking events in three counties. He attended the National Association of Broadcasters conference, re-establishing professional contacts and obtaining syndicated content for the radio and television stations. Dr. West serves on the advisory board for Wichita Independent School District's digital media and journalism pathways. He also serves on the advisory board for Remington High School's Digital Media/Journalism and Education pathways. He is in demand to provide training, workshops and critiques for high school programs in South Central Kansas. Dr. West finished a multi-year commitment to Envision, Inc. (Wichita-based international organization dedicated to serving the blind and vision impaired) by teaching podcasting and audio performance for their Summer High School Start-Up program at WSU. Over a dozen students participated in the weeklong audio portion, producing an original audio podcast/entertainment project at the end.

<u>Community Service</u>: As a department, the faculty provide professional advice in their special fields to various community organizations, such as **churches**, **local businesses and non-profit groups**. In addition to the organization participation listed above, we are developing podcasts for KBTL and BCTV with BOE/BOA academic departments, the Kansas Cooperative Extension Service (Butler County Horticulture and 4H), Shelter Insurance and financial investment groups. The Butler County Crisis Center uses our students to shape and coordinate their social media channels. All Mass Communication AAS majors are required to complete an **internship**; students are employed at a variety of newspapers, magazines, radio stations, television stations and production units throughout the Wichita and greater Kansas area. We have students producing church services in El Dorado for live and delayed streaming.

<u>Facilities:</u> The Mass Communication program is currently housed in approximately 1/3 of the 100 building on the El Dorado campus. Facilities include two general classrooms,

production areas for the newspaper and magazine, a newspaper/magazine morgue (previous editions), audio studios for the radio operation (control room, newsroom, recording studio, field equipment storage and utility/streaming room), and offices for Dr. West and Ms. Chastain. We share a media editing classroom, television soundstage, video control room, storage and Mr. Jacob's office IT. Funded by IT and the academic department, we have purchased replacement still cameras, a field video camera, new radio control equipment, two new studio video cameras, a NewTek video switcher and lighting for two performance spaces in the television soundstage. Podcasting studios planned for the BOE library and BOA student center will be available to all student/faculty/staff, along with portable podcasting equipment within the Mass Communications program

<u>Summary:</u> The Mass Communications program at Butler is considered one of the <u>strongest traditional media educational programs</u> in this part of the United States. Our students receive recognition in contests at the state, national and international levels. Professionals praise the amount of experience the program provides students; one 4-year professor commented our students receive more experience in two years than his students receive in four years. Despite a Bachelor degree considered as the minimum requirement for employment in Mass Communications, our graduates earn positions throughout Kansas with their journalism, electronic media and sports media skills. Universities outside of Kansas are eager to accept our course credits, allowing students the option of immediate employment or the pursuit of higher degrees. Universities within Kansas are reluctant to transfer any Mass Communication coursework from any 2-year or 4-year institution, despite accreditation or reputation.

MUSIC

Music Department Mission Statement

The Vocal and Instrumental Departments will facilitate learning for those interested in the activity and **careers in music**. The Music Department will also facilitate learning within the following services and activities: Concert Band, Pep Band, Jazz Ensemble, Show Band, String Ensemble, combos and small ensembles, Chamber Singers, Concert Choir, Butler A Cappella, Smorgaschords, Noteables, Headliners, lectures, master classes, workshops, and projects. These academic activities will address the needs of students and stakeholders in the region including:

- Preparing students for transfer to colleges and universities
- Preparing students for careers related to instrumental and/or vocal music
- Providing incumbent workforce training in music skills
- Providing instruction in personal interest areas
- Developing learning PACT skills
- Providing access to student learning through multiple locations and delivery systems
- Providing instructional leadership for the college
- Providing cultural and fine arts enrichment to students and stakeholders in the community and beyond through performances, the Butler Show Choir Festival, the Music Theatre Choral Festival, and the Regional Solo and Ensemble Festival, among other events

The Music Department is a performance-based system that evaluates its programs and services by documenting and evaluating student skills and knowledge and stakeholders' satisfaction. The Division has moved to an **online scholarship application process** which coordinates with the Butler website and division homepage.

Vocal Music Department Overview

The Butler Vocal Music ensembles participation and performance events:

- Concerts at community events
- Area high schools
- The Kansas State Fair
- Butler athletic events
- State conventions and musical theatre events
- Nursing homes, church and community groups, and fundraisers
- Butler Foundation events
- NAfME, ACDA, the KS State Water Convention
- State, regional and national music conventions

For the past ten years, the Butler Vocal Music Department has been invited to participate in various activities with the **Wichita Symphony Orchestra and Music Theatre of Wichita** and has performed for huge audiences from all over the state of Kansas. Singing tours are organized each semester and students visit local schools, perform concerts, and help to promote Butler in the region.

Vocal Music in 2022 has become more **involved in our local community** with over 20 planned performances outside of our traditional home concerts.

- Hundreds of thousands of people have watched excerpts of our performances on social media
- The KWCH Christmas special aired numerous times between Dec 16-30, 2022
- The choirs also organize and host two annual festivals in November and March:
 The Annual Show Choir Festival involves 300 high school and college students.
 This event brings in students from 12-16 different schools in Kansas and a Broadway clinician. We also host a Music Theatre Choral Festival where students have the opportunity to learn from industry professionals from around the world.
- Over the course of the year, it is projected that vocal music faculty, our students, and alums will attend 50 different high school performances and talk to directors, students and community members.

Our **vocal faculty** is taking part for the second year in a row as Jester judges. They will travel around the state on weekends between Oct 7-April 14 and judge various high school musicals. Only a few college instructors are picked to adjudicate for this esteemed competitive program.

Again in 2022, the Butler Concert Choir, under the direction of Matt Udland was invited to sing for the Spirit of Christmas holiday show at Century II, accompanied by the **Wichita Symphony Orchestra**. There were more than 3,000 in the audience and through the performance and mention in the programs, there was some incredible public relations for all of Butler Community College. The Headliners were invited to perform in the first ever "Live Music Theatre of Wichita Holiday Spectacular!" with four shows and an 80-member cast. Our own Matt Udland was one of the eight featured performers. Talk about **LOTS of great PR for Butler!!!** We also received a check for \$1,245.80 for helping with ticket sales.

Our annual **Library Christmas performance** is a nice thing we do each December for staff and students in the El Dorado Library. This has become a great tradition for the students and the Butler staff and faculty.

The **Butler Chambers Singers**, **directed by Chad Ingram**, were invited to partake in an invitational at Friends University where they rivaled the Singing Quakers. Many audience members attended and were wildly excited about the Chamber Singers performance and professionalism exhibited throughout the daylong festival.

Valerie Mack was invited to participate on a judging panel with Kristen Chenoweth in October 2022 at Friends University. She worked with some of the region's top talent and made many connections throughout the day.

Matt Udland has published many original musical arrangements for the A Cappella ensemble in the past several years. He is extremely busy with the extra tech duties, but could easily make a career out of publishing these magnificent arrangements. Schools would be clamoring for these pieces.

Amanda Pfenninger presented a recital with an Emporia State music faculty member, Dr. Scott Wichael, in January that was a free concert for the community. In her first semester on faculty, she revolutionized the class piano curriculum, added quality adjunct faculty, increased piano enrollment significantly, and reformatted our entire piano curriculum based on five local transfer institutions. Besides learning classical pieces, Butler students are learning improvisation and harmonization. Several students are training to play for area worship services. Butler piano students are collaborating with each other to perform duets and trios, and they are accompanying ensembles and soloists. She will be adjudicating area music festivals this Spring. She performed on a recital in Western Kansas with mezzo-soprano Katelyn Mattson on January 14, 2023. They performed the program that they brought to audiences at the 2022 Ad Astra Music Festival. Amanda is serving as the chairperson for the Soprano-Alto All-State choir which will perform at the Kansas Choral Directors Association's convention, July 13-14 in Topeka.

Our choreographer for the Butler Headliners for the past 12 years, **Stevie Mack** celebrated her 2nd year as a **Radio City Rockette**. She performed in the **Macy's Parade** and on the **Live with Kelly and Ryan TV** show in December. Stevie messages and FaceTime's the Headliners to check in with their progress and to clean choreography.

Our faculty is heavily involved in the **community** outside of Butler teaching, but in overtime are teaching private lessons, teaching dance, working with middle school and high school choirs, adjudicating for area choral and dance programs, choreographing for ensembles and musicals, and involved in church and community music programs.

This year, we will be **collaborating with the Butler theatre and instrumental music** program to provide a musical theatre experience for our students and the community with the show, "Working". Community members will be interviewed and their answers will turn into part of the script. This is a true community endeavor.

Several years ago, the Foundation provided monies for **new sound and lighting equipment** for the Butler Theatre. This equipment has been utilized by the entire Butler family at productions, meetings, open houses, showcases and in-service meetings over the years. Because of evolving technology and heavy use, this equipment is in dire need of replacement. The BOT has graciously approved the funding to upgrade the sound system and the FAC is hopeful that the BOT will approve the TFA regarding the much-needed **lighting and projection mapping** proposal.

Instrumental Music Department Overview

The Instrumental Music Department continues to pursue the long-standing goal of increasing the public's positive image of Butler Community College while refining the **quality and diversity** of our offerings in music education. Former Butler instrumental students are now highly respected for their leadership roles in four-year university music departments. These former students have become valued proponents of Butler's Instrumental Department.

Brett Martinez, Director of Bands. Instrumental Music Department Chair. Directs the Concert Band, Jazz Ensemble, Show Band, various chamber ensembles, and co-directs the Percussion Ensemble / Drumline with percussion instructor Andrew Slater. Also supervises the Sideliners Pep Band as well as the Instrumental Music scholarship students. Professional Organizations: Brett is a past-president of the Kansas Bandmasters Association. Brett is currently serving on the board of the Kansas Music Educators Association as Collegiate National Association for Music Education Co-advisor active member. At the national level, Brett is serving on the C-NAfME Advisory Council as the Southwestern Division representative for the National Association for Music Education. The Instrumental Music Department is continuing to pursue the long-standing goal of increasing the public's positive image of Butler Community College while refining the quality and diversity of our offerings in music education. Former Butler instrumental students are now highly respected in their leadership roles in the University music departments. These former students have become valued proponents of Butler and the Instrumental Department. We also have several Butler Alums who are teaching across Kansas.

The Instrumental Music Department's applied adjunct faculty consists of several highly respected professional musicians and educators. All have many years of experience teaching and performing in orchestras and bands ranging from the Wichita Symphony and

Music Theatre of Wichita to playing in a variety of major concert events that have appeared in the area. Additionally, Rick Moose, our **Sideliners Pep Band** director, continues to do an excellent job of developing the Pep Band's repertoire and working to make them an integral part of Butler Football and Basketball events.

Instrumental Music Performance and Activity Listings

- **1.Concert Band**: The Butler Concert Band is the hub of our Instrumental Music Department. We prepare and **perform high-quality** literature from masterworks of the Concert Band and Wind Ensemble repertoire as well as more contemporary works. This ensemble performs major concerts in the fall and spring as well as a patriotic concert during the **El Dorado Celebration of Freedom**.
- **2. Sideliners Pep Band**: This ensemble, consisting of nearly all students on Instrumental Music scholarship, is a highly visible component of the Butler Bands both on campus and within the greater community. By the end of basketball season the Sideliners will have performed at approximately twenty-five athletic or community events. Considering the number of fans at Butler athletic events, the Sideliners represent the Butler Instrumental Music department to tens of thousands of people each year.
- **3. Butler Jazz Ensemble and Show Band**: The Butler Jazz Ensemble performs literature from the big band era to the present day in various jazz styles. The Butler Show Band performs more popular music, as well as combo literature. These groups perform at our home concerts as well as at other area events throughout the year. Highlights include the Jazz Ensemble being a featured group at the **Celebration of Freedom Concert**, and the Show Band performing for "**Illuminations**" **at Botanica**.
- **4. Chamber Ensembles**: Our Brass Ensemble and Woodwind Ensemble perform a variety of small ensemble repertoire. In addition to performing at our home concerts, these groups are featured on our chamber recitals each semester. These recitals include our chamber ensembles as well as student soloists.
- **5. Drumline**: The drumline is an integral part of the Sideliners Pep Band as well as providing halftime entertainment at home football games. The drumline performs at home football games, as well as several **parades** in Butler County. Additionally, they performed at two **high school football games** last fall. One in Douglass, the other in Rosalia.

High School Recruitment and Ambassador Activities

Throughout the year Brett will make several high school visits. During these visits he works with the high school band in preparation for upcoming performances and talks with the students about performance and scholarship opportunities at Butler.

Brett is also representing Butler as a **clinician and adjudicator**. Brett has served as an adjudicator or clinician in Baldwin City, Douglass, South Barber HS, Erie, Wichita and Arkansas City. Last January Brett served as the director for the Wichita Public Schools All-City 11th and 12th Grade Band. Last summer he presented a session at the Kansas Bandmasters Association entitled Solo and Small Ensemble Festival: Preparation, Rules and Best Practices. He is also presenting a session at Kansas Music Educators Association in February entitled Collegiate NAfME Chapters: Unleashing the Potential.

Butler is also hosting several events, which will bring music students to our campus. **Regional Solo and Small Ensemble Festival**: Butler will be hosting this event, which will bring approximately 300 students to our campus, on Saturday, April 1

The Butler Band room is the rehearsal home for **the El Dorado Municipal Band** during their summer season. We are also the inclement weather performance site. Brett Martinez serves as one of the directors for the El Dorado Municipal Band.

Facility and Staffing Issues: There is a lack of practice rooms space. Students regularly cannot practice because there are no available practice rooms. Our Auditorium is in very high demand. All of our performing groups (Instrumental Music, Vocal Music, Theatre, Dance) need an additional formal performance space.

The Instrumental Music Department has formed several new ensembles and increased its performances over the last eight years, while no full-time faculty have been added. Brett Martinez is the only full-time Instrumental Music faculty member. We need to add an additional full-time faculty member to the Instrumental Music Department.

Scholarships

The only way our Instrumental Music Department can maintain current levels of performance, as well as continue to grow, is with continued Books and Tuition Scholarship support. Our students are extremely active within our department, across the college, and beyond. Books and Tuition Scholarships allow us to recruit both quality and quantity. The fact that we are able to offer these scholars to majors as well as non-majors means that we are recruiting not just for the Fine Arts Department, but for the entire college. We need to make sure our schedule has sufficient course offerings to allow non-music majors to continue to accept music scholarships.

SPEECH

Full-Time Faculty Member

Greg May (Chair), Kateri Grillot (Lead), Matthew Webster, and Full-Time Vacancy (formally the department Chair, Alexis Hopkins)

Overview

The Department of Speech Communication provides a **general education curriculum** that focuses on the in-depth study of human communication and public speaking that strengthens other majors and enhances the general education offerings of the College. The faculty prepares students for success in a broad range of settings by providing the necessary communication competence. Communication courses prepare students to be confident, credible, and articulate communicators. Course offerings include Public Speaking, Interpersonal Communication, Introduction to Human Communication, and Intercultural Communication.

Speech Department Overview

The Butler Department of Communication is the largest department in the Fine Arts and Communication Division. During the 2020-21 school year, the Speech Department taught 5865 credit hours in three separate modalities: face-to-face, online, and blended classes.

The Speech faculty judge various local speech competitions as well as state debate and forensics tournaments.

The Speech department is exploring the possibility of establishing a **Speech Club** and joining the local chapter of **Toastmasters**.

Theatre Department Mission Statement

Butler's Theatre Department will facilitate learning within the department instructional programs and services (performance, workshops, community service) that address the needs of students and stakeholders in the region including:

- Preparing students for transfer to colleges and universities
- Preparing students for careers in performance, technical theatre, teaching and/or related skills
- Providing incumbent workforce training in theatrical skills
- Providing instruction in personal interest areas
- Developing Learning PACT skills
- Providing access to student learning through multiple locations and delivery systems
- Providing instructional leadership for the college

Theatre Department Overview

Having participated as a pilot department in unit Performance Management in the college's commitment to AQIP/IPRA, the Theatre Department uses a **performance-based system** that evaluates programs and services by documenting and evaluating student skills and knowledge and stakeholder satisfaction.

- The department opened it's 2022-2023 theatrical season with a production of "**Scapin**" by Bill Irwin and Marc O'Donnell.
- The second show of the season was the presentation of "Cleopatra". The production played to sold out houses.
- This February 21-March 1 the department, for its annual Children's Theatre Show, will produce "Honestly Frank", the newest play, in a series of plays, written and directed by theatre department chair, Bob Peterson. Before coming to the production elementary teachers will be sent classroom material that includes vocabulary words that will be used in the show's dialogue. Upon arriving at the performance, the teachers will receive a "Teacher's Guide" that includes critical questions to be discussed with their students after seeing the show. The questions will address themes illustrated in the production. When the students leave the theatre, they will be given an Activity Book, an "Honestly Frank" bookmark and an Alligator visor. Over 1600 students are projected to see the production over an eight-matinee run. The production serves as one of our most significant recruiting events.
- The department will close its theatrical season with the musical "Working". The Tonynominated musical will be produced in collaboration with the vocal and instrumental music department.
- Butler Theatre alum have gone on to success as film producers, regional theatre
 directors, department heads, professional actors, professional theatre and film
 technicians. One of our former students, Scott McPhail (1992 AA; 2000 & 2013
 Commencement Speaker), is the Executive Director, International Creative Services at
 Paramount Pictures.
- The department provides technical support for all instrumental, vocal, and dance performances.

- The department sometimes provides technical support for productions at El Dorado High School and several local churches.
- This past October, Theatre Chair, Bob Peterson received the **Mary Jane Teall Best Actor Award** for his performance in THE FATHER. The production was directed by Dr. Phil Speary, Dean of Academic Support Services.
- The past summer (2022) Bob Peterson performed with the Kansas City Symphony in the "Symphony in the Flint Hills" concert.

SUMMARY

As we meet the needs of our students and stakeholders, we must remember that the FAC Division is engaged in making **lifelong connections** with our students. Theatre productions, art shows, musicals, dance recitals, broadcasts, and publications remain a continuing draw for our former students. These events and the instructors who produce them are key elements in **maintaining a strong relationship between the college, our alumni, and the community**. Our current and former Fine Arts and Communication students are ambassadors of our division and the college.

Every decision we make in the FAC is based on a single question: **How does this serve the needs of our students?** We fully support the **mission and vision** of the college. Our students have embraced the new Student Pledge. Faculty and staff work to be good stewards of taxpayers' and donors' dollars. We are collectively working to move our division's graduates into the regional workforce, and to plan for the **future**.

Trustee Smith proposed the following amendments to the agenda:

Trustee Smith thought it would be more appropriate to do when the new Trustees come aboard next year. Dr. Krull indicated it has historically been done annually. Lillian Rippe, SGA President shared that they have been pre-planning spring activities and will finalize them at their retreat next week. They expect another busy semester.

Operational Staff (YouTube @ 21:21)

There was no OpStaff report this month.

Professional Employees (YouTube @ 21:28)

Dr. Sader shared an update about PDD and some of the training faculty are participating in this week. He shared that keynote speaker David Katz gave an interesting presentation on the relationship between student success, perception and the neurology behind it. Faculty has been participating in breakout sessions around technology, encountering unconscious bias, yoga, and classroom dynamics and innovations. Breakout sessions are led by our own faculty. He also thanked the Faculty Development team for their work on PDD week. Trustee Good asked what percentage of faculty attend those. Dr. Sader didn't have an exact percentage, but attendance is taken and it is required of full-time faculty. They receive professional development points for their attendance as well.

Dr. Sader also announced this year's Master Teacher recipient – Jared McGinley. Professor McGinley is a lead instructor in Management & Marketing and also leads DECA at Butler.

Board Finance Committee (YouTube @ 28:18)

Trustee Good reported that there were no questions regarding the Statement of Revenue and Expenditures. The audit will be completed and presented next month. Trustee mileage reports were discussed, and Trustees can see Kent Williams following the meeting for questions.

Foundation Board Report (YouTube @ 29:56)

Trustee Rhodes reported that the Foundation Board will meet in February, so he'll have more to share following that.

President's Report (YouTube @ 30:06)

Dr. Krull shared that KACCT will host "Donuts with Legislators" on January 18 from 7:30am-9am. Those in attendance will greet legislators as they come in to the Capitol.

Dr. Krull also shared that there hasn't been any work done on the Ball Fields at East Park or McDonald stadium. She will provide updates as soon as she has an opportunity to talk with the city.

Butler has been invited to be involved in community meetings as USD 259 works to hire their next superintendent and will be engaged in that process.

A group of staff members are working to prepare the HLC assurance argument in preparation for the visit in April. Brian Inbody from Neosho CC will be here on March 6 for a mock visit. He's a long-time peer reviewer and will provide valuable feedback. She will keep the Trustees apprised of any meetings they may need to be a part of for that visit. Updated Trustee Handbooks will be provided at the next meeting.

Dr. Krull also shared that Monday morning at PDD it was announced that Theresa Thompson (full time) and Masako Maeda (adjunct) were the recipients of the John & Suanne Roueche Excellence in Teaching Award. These awards are based on student nominations.

Educational Facilities Authority Report (YouTube @ 36:42)

Trustee Sherrer and Trustee Good reported they were unable to attend the last meeting. Dr. Krull shared that there were a few bills approved. There is discussion on moving these meetings to a quarterly basis, as well as upcoming operational updates.

MONITORING REPORTS (YouTube @ 38:02)

There was no monitoring report this month.

BOARD STRATEGIC DISCUSSION - ISSUES AND OPPORTUNITIES

- A. Server and Storage Life Cycle Refresh (YouTube @ 38:06) Christina Byram, Deputy CIO, gave an overview of the current server and storage environment. She shared the equipment reaches its lifecycle in May, and the manufacturer will no longer support the hardware or software. Over the last eight months, options for replacement have been reviewed. On premise, cloud and private cloud options exist. Cloud environments provide much better scalability, as well as disaster recovery and business continuity. Cloud solutions would also reduce the amount of cooling needed in the data center. She explained the numbers being reviewed are top-end numbers and they're working very hard to make costeffective decisions. Information Services will bring a couple of options for review, as well as recommendations. Trustee Winslow asked to be provided with a list stating equipment being replaced and purchased with costs detailed. Christina indicated that all of that information will be provided to Trustees. Trustee Smith asked clarifying questions about the costs in 2017. He also asked about the upgrades to the hard storage, and whether that room is still necessary. Bill Young provided information about the items housed in that room and why those upgrades were still necessary.
- B. <u>Butler Student Pledge (YouTube @ 49:40)</u> Lillian Rippe, SGA President, and Sherri Conard, SGA Advisor & Director of First Year Experience presented the Butler Student Pledge, which was developed with feedback from Butler students. They had seen the idea of a student pledge in other institutions and wanted to

- bring that to Butler. She outlined their process used to develop the pledge, which included surveys the team used to edit the pledge into its final form. Dr. Krull shared the goal is to have the pledge displayed in the 5000 Building Foyer, the El Dorado Student Union and the 600 Building in El Dorado. Trustee Rhodes expressed that he was impressed with their process. Trustee Good congratulated them on their great work.
- C. <u>Board Governance KORA Report (YouTube @ 54:19)</u> A summary of KORA requests this quarter was provided in the Board Book. Trustee Smith asked about a specific request that was filed. Trustee Rhodes shared that the request in question was not filled, because the information wasn't available in the format requested. Trustee Smith also indicated that he hadn't received projector information. Trustee Winslow provided comments related to the Culinary Building purchase KORA request. She also expressed that signage needs to be added to the building. Dr. Krull said that the bid is out, and it's being worked on. Trustee Smith indicated that the digital sign could be an option to display it as a Butler building for the time being.
- D. Advertising (YouTube @ 1:02:30) Trustee Smith shared information about Grove9 advertising as a possible option for advertising. He feels that it would be good to have an outside perspective. Trustee Smith will send contact information to Dr. Krull. Trustee Jolly expressed concern about having one particular firm present without giving others the option. Dr. Krull reminded everyone that College Relations & Marketing has an expert team and that enrollment declines are not solely a marketing issue. Trustee Winslow suggested putting out a RFP for marketing proposals, because she doesn't feel what the college is doing is working. Kelly Snedden provided data analytics for the fall semester, showing that web and social media traffic is up, indicating that awareness is growing. Trustee Smith shared that he was trying to provide an avenue for new ideas to explore to share what makes Butler different.
- E. Work Sessions (YouTube @ 1:14:50) Trustee Smith indicated that he'd like the Board to be able to have input on what they talked about at work sessions. Dr. Krull indicated that Trustees always have that option, and asked that they let her know ahead of time what they'd like to discuss so that staff can have the information prepared. Trustee Rhodes pointed out that there are some schedules as it relates to the budget, but otherwise the Board can help guide that discussion. Trustee Good also said that she and Trustee Winslow need to get together to discuss Board Evaluations.
- F. <u>General Trustee Thoughts (YouTube @1:17:57) Trustee Smith said that he</u> would like to see an agenda item added to Strategic Discussion for Trustees to bring forth ideas that they may have. Trustee Jolly requested that if this happened she would like to see a time frame for each person to speak, to ensure efficient use of time. Trustee Rhodes reminded Trustees that they can always amend the agenda if there are items they would like to discuss.

BOARD ACTION ITEMS

A. <u>Affirmation of Service and Standards of Practice (YouTube @1:19:38)</u> – Dr. Krull shared that traditionally this affirmation of service and standards of practice are done on an annual basis. KACCT recommends this be reaffirmed each year to

- reiterate the work Trustees do to move institutions forward. Trustee Good moved to approve the Affirmation of Service and Standards of Practice. Trustee Sherrer seconded. Trustees were offered the option to sign the affirmation. Trustee Smith and Winslow expressed disagreement about language in the affirmation. On roll call vote, the motion to approve the Affirmation of Service and Standards of Practice passed 4-2, with Trustee Smith and Trustee Winslow voting nay. Trustee Braungardt was absent. Trustees Good, Jolly, Rhodes and Sherrer signed the affirmation.
- B. Approval of Agreement with ProTrain Training Provider (YouTube @ 1:25:00) Dr. Krull shared the agreement is with a third-party provider through BETA. ProTrain provides the training, while BETA helps with enrollment and registration. Trustee Winslow asked if these were online courses and Dr. Krull shared that some are, but not all. Butler does not provide instructors, space or technology. Trustee Sherrer moved to approve the agreement. Trustee Good seconded. On roll call vote, the motion passed 6-0. Trustee Braungardt was absent.
- C. <u>Augusta Neighborhood Revitalization Plan (YouTube @ 1:28:30)</u> Trustee Smith moved to approve as written. Trustee Jolly seconded. On roll call vote the motion passed 6-0, with Trustee Braungardt absent.
- D. Approval of Updated Mission & Vision Statements (YouTube @ 1:30:30) —
 Trustee Sherrer moved to approve the updated mission and vision statements.
 Trustee Jolly seconded. Dr. Krull shared that Cory Teubner and Dr. Terry Sader were present for questions as they were part of the committee that led the work.
 Trustee Winslow asked if the Professional Association was in support of the new mission and vision. Dr. Sader stated that they are in full support of this update.
 Trustee Smith expressed that he would have preferred Board input ahead of time. Trustee Winslow agreed. On roll call vote, the motion passed 5-1, with Trustee Smith voting nay. Trustee Braungardt was absent. Trustee Jolly thanked all of those involved with the committee for their time and input.
- E. <u>Violation of Board Policy (YouTube @ 1:34:01)</u> At this time, Trustee Rhodes turned the meeting over to Trustee Good, as the alleged violation was against him. Trustee Good read a statement from Trustee Braungardt on behalf of the committee charged with investigating the violation. The committee agreed policy was violated, but recommended no action. Trustee Smith expressed that he wanted to make sure that everyone was being treated the same. Trustee Jolly stated that at the time of the violation, it was made clear to Trustee Rhodes that they felt there had been a violation. She said if these were going to continue to be brought forward, the Board needs to either change the standard to which they are held or move forward professionally. Trustee Smith asked Trustee Rhodes where the statement he read came from. Trustee Rhodes provided context. Trustee Jolly moved to agree that Trustee Rhodes violated the Code of Conduct and that no action will be taken. Trustee Sherrer seconded. Trustee Good urged Trustees to stop with the unprofessional behavior. On roll call vote, the motion passed 5-0. Trustee Rhodes did not vote, and Trustee Braungardt was absent.
- F. Approval of December 13, 2022 Minutes (YouTube @ 1:42:38) Trustee Smith moved to add "Trustee Smith stated that Board Bylaws and State Statute state that Trustees *shall* be paid mileage." to Board Discussion item E. Trustee Winslow seconded. On roll call vote, the motion passed 6-0, with Trustee Braungardt absent. Trustee Sherrer moved to accept the minutes as amended.

She asked how that could be improved. Dr. Mohammad shared that Faculty Development and the Deans are working on training, and adoption rates have improved. Dr. Mohammad reported that final credit hour enrollment for fall was 62,135. That compares to the census day number of 62,656. Trustee Good asked clarifying questions about the numbers. Dr. Mohammad explained that the numbers are very fluid, and the college is required to report census day numbers only.

OVERVIEW:

This academic articulation agreement is made and entered into by Butler Community College, hereinafter referred to as BCC, and Wichita State University, hereinafter referred to as WSU. By this agreement BCC and WSU express a shared commitment to increasing opportunities for student access to, and success in, higher education.

PURPOSE:

This agreement provides students who have completed an Associate in Nursing degree at BCC the opportunity to complete a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree at WSU.

The RN¹ to BSN² degree completion program at WSU, offered completely online, is intended for students who have graduated from an accredited nursing program and hold a current license in nursing. To be eligible for admission, applicants must have:

- An earned associate degree from a regionally accredited school, with an accredited nursing program.
- 2) A minimum 2.5 cumulative grade point average.
- 3) A passing score on NCLEX-RN (very recent graduates may be able to begin the program before sitting for this examination).
- 4) Completion of all required prerequisite courses.

WSU awards 30 upper division credit hours upon documentation of successfully completing the NCLEX exam.

ADDITIONAL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS:

- 1) One of the WSU graduation requirements is that students must have earned 60 credit hours from a 4-year institution. With the 30 retroactive credits + 31 hours of new course work at WSU, the total is 61 credit hours (thus, this requirement is met).
- 2) For all bachelor's degrees granted by WSU, at least 30 credit hours must be earned at WSU. In addition, at least 24 of the last 30 credit hours applied towards the degree must have been completed at WSU.

The RN to BSN degree completion program at WSU is completely online and accessible 24 hours a day. It can be completed in as little as three (3) semesters or up to six (6) years.

Narrative

Butler's ten-year accreditation cycle will end in 2023. For continuation of our accreditation, HLC will conduct a Comprehensive Evaluation in April 2023. A team of trained evaluators from peer institutions will visit Butler April 17-19 interviewing college employees, the Board of Trustees, and students. Prior to the visit, the team will have studied the Assurance Argument narrative the college prepared and submitted which is a 35,000-word document explaining how Butler meets the HLC accreditation criteria including eighteen core components and sixty-eight subcomponents. Any areas of concern within the criteria will be explained as well. More than 400 documents will be linked as "evidence" files in support of the Assurance Argument.

Current Outcomes

The six members of the Comprehensive Evaluation Steering Committee have written portions for each criterion in the Assurance Narrative based on college documents and employee interviews. The committee has met regularly to monitor progress.

Action items for future outcomes

By mid-February, the committee will begin to upload the entire Assurance Narrative and "evidence" files into the HLC portal for final submission early in March. Once finalized the Assurance Argument and files will be uploaded to a SharePoint folder for access by college personnel and Trustees. The Assurance Argument will be reviewed at the February Board work session. A mock visit is scheduled for March 6th.

Strategic Alignment

Planning and preparation for the HLC 2023 visit advances the Strategic Goal: **Drive Institutional Sustainability and Growth**. Effective planning and preparation for HLC evaluation is crucial for Butler to be given continued accreditation to maintain credibility as a college, be allowed to grant degrees, and receive federal funding.

Kansas Promise Scholarship

Narrative

The Kansas Promise Scholarship is a 'last dollar' scholarship program that covers tuition, fees, books, and required materials for qualifying Kansas residents enrolled in eligible programs. Students participating in the scholarship program must complete their Butler program within 36 months and must agree to live and work in Kansas for at least two consecutive years after program completion.

Current Outcomes

The Kansas Promise Scholarship program was new beginning Fall 2021. During the 2021-2022 academic year Butler disbursed \$320,684.15 to 143 students. For the Fall 2022 semester Butler disbursed \$280,584 to 186 students. As of 2/3/2023, Spring 2023 disbursement is expected to be \$279,103 to 187 students and for Summer 2023, 18 students have been awarded \$14,503. Butler will continue to award Spring and Summer students until the semester deadlines. To date, 41 students have completed their Kansas Promise educational program.

Action items for future outcomes

Continue to promote the Kansas Promise Scholarship to students enrolled in eligible programs. This is an excellent opportunity for students to complete their Butler program with little-to-no out of pocket expense for tuition, fees, books, and required materials.

Second Chance Pell

Narrative

According to the VERA Institute of Justice, incarcerated people who participate in postsecondary education programs are 48 percent less likely to recidivate than those who do not. The odds of recidivism decrease as people achieve higher levels of education. (https://www.vera.org/news/back-to-school-a-common-sense-strategy-to-lower-recidivism). Beginning with the Fall 2022 semester, Butler was accepted to participate in the U.S. Department of Education's Second Chance Pell Experimental Site Initiative. Participation in this initiative allows Butler to award Pell grant to incarcerated students who are otherwise eligible, removing one of the biggest barriers to postsecondary education for this population of students.

Current Outcomes

Acceptance to the Second Chance Pell Experimental Site Initiative was new beginning Fall 2022. For the Fall 2022 semester Butler disbursed \$33,502 in Pell grant to 53 students. As of 2/3/2022, Spring 2023 disbursement is expected to be \$65,534 to 77 students.

Action items for future outcomes

Continue collaboration between Butler and the Kansas Department of Corrections for participation in the Second Chance Pell Experimental Site Initiative. Continue assisting students through the enrollment and financial aid processes for student success and potential enrollment growth at the El Dorado Correctional Facility campus location.

Butler has been proactively using tools like AVISO and Tableau to assist in departmental monitoring of student success.

Current Outcomes

Butler's Institutional Retention rate reached its historical records of 61% with the Fall 2021 (AY 2022) cohort which was reported to the National Center of Educational Statistics in February 2023. More than half the departments—19 out of 30—reported either no change or an increase in the retention of their Fall 2021 cohorts compared to the retention of their Fall 2020 cohorts.
